



Electoral registration form for a member of Her Majesty's armed forces (or spouse)



Register to vote

As a member of the British Army, the Royal Navy or the Royal Air Force, you need to be on the **electoral register** to vote in UK elections and referendums.

If you are based overseas, you can register as a **service voter** by filling in an electoral registration form for members of the armed forces. This form allows you to be registered to vote at an address in the UK while you are posted abroad.

You can also register as a service voter if you are married to a member of the armed forces or if you live in the UK but may be posted elsewhere at short notice. As a service voter, you must renew your registration **every** year, but you can cancel it at any time.

If you are based in the UK, you can also register in the normal way by filling in the registration form delivered to your home between September and November every year. If you did not register last autumn or have moved since then, you can still register by filling in a standard registration form.

How do I register to vote?

- 1 Fill in the electoral registration form.
- 2 Make sure **you** sign the declaration.
- 3 Return your completed form as soon as possible to your electoral registration office. You can find their contact details at www.aboutmyvote.co.uk

Please note: the deadline for registering to vote can be up to two months before an election.

Who has my personal details?

There are two versions of the electoral register – the **full** version and the **edited** version. Your details will appear on the full version of the register, but you can **choose** whether or not your details appear on the edited register.

The full register is used for elections and referendums, preventing and detecting crime, and checking applications for credit. The edited register is available for general sale and can be used for commercial activities such as marketing.

How can I vote?

You can vote in one of **three** ways.

- **By post** if you want your ballot paper sent to you. You should be aware that it will be sent to you about a week before the election. So, you need to consider whether there is enough time to receive your ballot paper, mark your vote and return it **before** voting closes on election day. Ballot papers that arrive after this time will **not** be counted.
- **By proxy** if you want someone else to vote on your behalf. Your proxy must be aged 18 or over, a British, Irish or Commonwealth citizen and be living in the UK. Your proxy can either vote at the polling station for the area where you are registered, or by post.
- **In person** if you are in the UK on election day. You can only vote at the polling station where you are registered to vote in the UK. You cannot vote in person if you, or your proxy, have applied to vote by post. If you have appointed a proxy, you can still vote in person, provided your proxy has not already voted.

If you want to vote by post or by proxy, you need to fill in one of the application forms that accompany this form.

Voting by post

You can apply to vote by post for a particular election, for a set period of time or for all future elections. But, you must be registered to vote first. Postal votes can be sent out to addresses in the UK and abroad.

How do I apply to vote by post?

- 1** Fill in the postal vote application form.
- 2** Make sure **you** sign the form.
- 3** Return it to your electoral registration office so it arrives at least six working days before the election.

What happens after I've returned this form?

- Your ballot paper will be sent to you about one week before the election. It may be issued as late as four working days before election day.
- If it does not arrive, contact your electoral registration office (in Scotland, contact the returning officer at your local council) for a replacement ballot paper. You must do this by 5pm on the day **before** the election at the latest.
- When you have received your ballot paper, mark your vote, sign the declaration of identity and get someone to witness your signature.
- Make sure you return your postal vote so it arrives by election day. If you're sending it from abroad, you will need to pay the postage. If it arrives after voting closes, it will not be counted. If it is too late to post it back and you are in the UK, you can hand it in at your polling station or to the returning officer at your local council on election day.
- Your postal vote will be mixed with all the others before counting begins, so your vote will be kept secret.

Voting by proxy

You can apply to vote by proxy for a particular election, for a set period of time or for all future elections. This form allows you to apply to vote by proxy for as long as you remain registered as a service voter.

How do I apply to vote by proxy?

- 1** Fill in the proxy vote application form.
- 2** You must ask your proxy if they are willing to vote on your behalf.
- 3** Your proxy must be eligible to vote in the elections at which you wish to vote.
- 4** Make sure **you** sign the form. Your proxy can also sign the form, but they do not have to.
- 5** Return your completed form to your electoral registration office so it arrives at least six working days before the election.

What happens after I've returned this form?

- Your proxy must go to **your** polling station to vote. If your proxy cannot get to the polling station, they can apply to vote for you by post. Your electoral registration office can give you more details about this.
- Your proxy will be sent a proxy poll card before the election telling them which polling station they have to go to.
- You must let your proxy know how you want them to vote on your behalf, for example, which candidate or which party.
- If you are able to go to your polling station on election day, you can vote as long as your proxy has not already done so or has not applied to vote by post.
