Although the "extensive, forked canal basin had been created by 1852, the sites adjacent to it remained largely undeveloped for most of the next decade. The works are not shown on Peel and Cobbett's map of 1864, though the Crown Nail Co. is mentioned in the 1865 trade directory. The earliest building of the works is the large manufacturing shed shown on the 1871 map, situated in the angle of the two sections of canal basin. Both elements of the surviving frontage building are shown on the large scale 1886 OS map.

The two phases of building along the Commercial Road frontage appear to survive relatively well. The larger, five-bay building to the S is of good quality red facing brick, with bold blue brick plinth and detail, sandstone sills and discontinuous string at ground floor, and nicely detailed metal-framed windows surviving at first floor only. The building has two tall floors above a basement, and an attic storey with windows in the gable ends. The smaller scale two-storey, two-bay element to the N is of mixed brick with simpler detailing, and possibly represents the earlier of the two structures. The works building to the rear was not accessible, but appears to survive relatively well, though is of very utilitarian design. Until its recent closure, this works was the last surviving nail makers in Wolverhampton, and therefore a significant survival of a once important industry in the city. The continuation of the buildings in the same industrial use since their construction is of great significance, and may mean that they retain important evidence of the development of that industry over the past 140 years.(7)

In 1957 it was handed over to the Sisters of Sain Joseph of Tarbes who opened a school. In 2004 the school closed completely, however the Sisters continue to live there for the present and 'Almeda' or Danesbury house remains largely unaltered from its time of building.

The Sunbeamland Works represent one of the most important surviving monuments relating to the transport and motor heritage of Wolverhampton. Its height and distinctive polygonal shape mark it out as a landmark building on a major access road into the city.

The site is shown as open land on a map of 1827. By 1842 Edward Perry had established a japanning and tin-plate works at the north west end of the site fronting on to Paul Street. The remainder of the site was open land. Perry died in 1869 and the works were purchased in 1871 by John Marston. A detailed map of this date shows a large works occupying the western half of the site, on a different footprint to the earlier works, and marked as Japan Works. To the east are other works buildings and a number of terraced houses fronting on to Paul Street. By the end of the 1880s Marston, like many other of the japanners in the town, was looking to diversify and in 1887 produced his first bicycle at the Paul Street Works. The marque 'Sunbeam' was registered in 1888. As the business grew the Paul Street Works became too constricted and Marston established a separate company, The Villiers Cycle Components Company, in Villiers Street in 1898. By the end of the 19th century Marston was experimenting with prototypes for motor cars and car radiators were produced at Paul Street. By the early 20th century Marston was experimenting with motorcycle production and parts of the Paul Street Works were given over to motorcycle manufacture. Bicycle and motorcycle assembly and finishing were based on the Pool Street side of the works, while radiators were produced on the Jeddo Street ranges.

The motorcycle and cycle businesses were sold off in 1937 and the works then concentrated on radiator and heat exchanger production for the motor and aviation industries. The firm of Marston-Excelsior continued production of radiators etc into the 1960s but gradually moved production to its Wobaston Road, Fordhouses, factory. The Paul Street Works were bought by Mucklow Ltd in 1967 by which time the works were semi-derelict. They were leased to the die casting firm of CE Marshall Ltd. The works were finally closed in 1999 and

The exterior fabric of the buildings shows several phases of construction, the earliest apparent survival being at the southern tip of the works. The ranges are brick built, generally of three tall storeys, well-lit by regularly-spaced large metal windows, presenting relatively homogeneous facades, particularly to Pool Street and Paul Street. The functions of the various parts of the works have been identified by the Wolverhampton History and Heritage Society on a view of the works published in a 1914 sales catalogue.(2)

The ownership of the early works by John Marston, a former mayor of Wolverhampton, and a significant historical figure, responsible for bringing pumped water and electricity to the town, give the works added significance in the local context. (3)

Building recording and assessment in 2007 revealed that elements of the historic development of the site from the mid-19th to the mid-20th centuries survive. No part of Edward Perry's original japanning works survive above ground, though structures remain from the time when John Marston took over the works in 1871. The manufactory has undergone periodic refurbishment and sometimes radical alteration, the most drastic of which occurred in the 1930s, when a large section of the 19th century fabric of the central block was demolished. This must be the work of the architect Hutchings, and was built for his normal clients, Butlers, but is grander than his Tuscan doorcases at the Golden Eagle and New Crown. The canted bays have had their windows replaced in uPVC, but retain their original wooden cornices. There was a garden at the rear and it may survive. An old council committee report refers to the 'Plan of proposed new road and public house between Willenhall Road and Fraser Street, for W. Butler & Co. Ltd.' This is probably the first true 'improved' pub in Wolverhampton, and it seems that the whole street was developed for Butlers with the pub as its principal building. This historical and contextual importance, together with its delightful doorcase, mean that on balance it is worth putting on the local list.(1)

This new works was on the traditional courtyard plan, entered through a covered central carriageway, given architectural emphasis by the use of pointed arches for both the carriageway and tall window in the gable above.

Although the building survives, the frontage has been altered to the point where it is almost unrecognisable as the original building. The original detail of the facade is shown in a photo of 1902. The central gabled element shown, with its Gothic arched carriageway and window above have now been removed; windows have been replaced and their segmental arches replaced with flat lintels; the elevation tiled and later painted. It is not clear whether the plan form of the former carriage works survives behind the frontage.

As the business grew the Paul Street Works became too constricted and Marston established a separate company, The Villiers Cycle Components Company, in Villiers Street in 1898. By the end of the 19th century Marston was experimenting with prototypes for motor cars and car radiators were produced at Paul Street. By the early 20th century Marston was experimenting with motorcycle production and parts of the Paul Street Works were given over to motorcycle manufacture. Bicycle and motorcycle assembly and finishing were based on the Pool Street side of the works, while radiators were produced on the Jeddo Street ranges.

The motorcycle and cycle businesses were sold off in 1937 and the works then concentrated on radiator and heat exchanger production for the motor and aviation industries. The firm of Marston-Excelsior continued production of radiators etc into the 1960s but gradually moved production to its Wobaston Road, Fordhouses, factory. The Paul Street Works were bought by Mucklow Ltd in 1967 by which time the works were semi-derelict. They were leased to the die casting firm of CE Marshall Ltd. The works were finally closed in 1999 and the premises have been unoccupied since that time. (1)

The exterior fabric of the buildings shows several phases of construction, the earliest apparent survival being at the southern tip of the works. The ranges are brick built, generally of three tall storeys, well-lit by regularly-spaced large metal windows, presenting relatively homogeneous facades, particularly to Pool Street and Paul Street. The functions of the various parts of the works have been identified by the Wolverhampton History and Heritage Society on a view of the works published in a 1914 sales catalogue.(2)

The ownership of the early works by John Marston, a former mayor of Wolverhampton, and a significant historical figure, responsible for bringing pumped water and electricity to the town, give the works added significance in the local context. (3)

Building recording and assessment in 2007 revealed that elements of the historic development of the site from the mid-19th to the mid-20th centuries survive. No part of Edward Perry's original japanning works survive above ground, though structures remain from the time when John Marston took over the works in 1871. The manufactory has undergone periodic refurbishment and sometimes radical alteration, the most drastic of which occurred in the 1930s, when a large section of the 19th century fabric of the central block was demolished. A very restrained neo-Georgian design in maroon brick with grey stone details, on an exceptionally important city centre site, it makes its impact by careful articulation, with a rhythm of three bays, followed by one projecting bay, each marked by a first floor window with pedimented aedicule, leading up to a three bay projecting centre, distinguished by a stone attic. The ground floor is continuously articulated by Tuscan pilasters.(1)

The original infirmary

The original infirmary was designed by the architect T H Fleeming (1849 -1935). The infirmary was built by Wolverhampton builders Henry Willcock & Co. at a cost of £13,000 and opened in 1888, providing three men's and three women's wards with thirty beds and five children's cots. A significant part of the cost was met by local philanthropist Philip Horsman, who also donated the Art Gallery to the town and whose benefaction is commemorated in the Fountain in St. Peter's Gardens. It is constructed of red brick with elaborate brick details and stone dressings. It is built to an irregular plan in a simple Gothic style under a plain clay tiled roof with crested ridge tiles and two spired turrets, one of which has an inscribed stone opaque bearing the legend: "EYE INFIRMARY AD 1887". Some of the original sash windows have been replaced and late 20th century extensions to the original west front have detracted from the character and appearance of the original building.
